

Derived unit conversion worksheet

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In chemistry, a derived unit is an SI unit of measurement derived as a product of one or more of the seven base units. For example, the SI unit of force is the derived unit newton (N): One newton is equal to 1 m·kg/s2. Conversions require only basic math, but they're very useful calculations to know how to do: even in an era of convenient online calculators, being able to do quick mental conversions is useful for completing household tasks. In the classroom, it can be helpful to ask students for estimations. For instance, ask a student something like: do you think 10 tablespoons is closer to one cup or one gallon? Their response gives you great insight into their understanding of conversions. The worksheets below include basic conversions that will be helpful if a student is struggling with the concept. (Deborah Tannen, That's Not What I Meant!: How Conversational Style Makes or Breaks Your Relationships, Random House, 1992) Transactional and Interactional Functions of Conversation"[T]wo different kinds of conversational interaction can be distinguished—those in which the primary focus is on the exchange of information (the transactional function of conversation), and those in which the primary purpose is to establish and maintain social relations (the interactional function of conversation) (Brown and Yule, 1983). In transactional uses of conversation the primary focus is on the message, whereas interactional uses of conversation focus primarily on the social needs of the participants... "Conversation also reflects the rules and procedures that govern face-to-face encounters, as well as the constraints that derive from the use of spoken language. This is seen in the nature of turns, the role of topics, how speakers repair trouble spots, as well as the syntax and register of conversational discourse."(Jack C. Wells, "Of Conversation: An Apology," 1901) Contextualization Cues "[In conversation], speakers use contextualization cues, including paralinguistic and prosodic features, word choice, and ways of structuring information, to signal the speech activity in which they are engaged—that is, what they think they are doing when they produce a particular utterance. The use of contextualization cues is automatic, learned in the process of learning language in a particular speech community. But whereas speakers focus on the meaning they wish to convey and the interactional goals they wish to achieve, their use of contextualization cues becomes the basis for how they are judged. When expectations regarding the use of contextualization cues are relatively similar, utterances are likely to be interpreted more or less as intended. But when such expectations are relatively different, speakers' intentions and abilities are likely to be misevaluated."(Deborah Tannen, Conversational Style: Analyzing Talk Among Friends, 2nd ed. There are 2000 pounds in 1 ton. Time between slipping on a peel and smacking the pavement = 1 bananosecondExplanation: Instead of expressing the unit in terms of nanoseconds, it's bananoseconds because a banana caused the fall. 1 millionth of a mouthwash = 1 microscopeExplanation: This refers to the popular mouthwash, Scope. The metric prefix "micro" means one millionth. 1 million bicycles = 1 megacyclesExplanation: The metric prefix "mega" means 106 or one million. Weight an evangelist carries with God = 1 billigramExplanation: This refers to the American evangelist Billy Graham. Time it takes to sail 220 yards at 1 nautical mile per hour = Knotfurlong 365.25 days of drinking low-calorie beer = 1 Lite year 16.5 feet in the Twilight Zone = 1 Rod SerlingExplanation: The rod is a unit of length equal to 16.5 feet. Rod Serling is the American tv producer, screenwriter, and narrator responsible for "The Twilight Zone." Basic unit of laryngitis - 1 horsepowerExplanation: One symptom of laryngitis is hoarseness. This is a play on words, substituting hertz (like pain, but with a "z") for hertz. 1 millionth of a fish = 1 microficheExplanation: The word "microfiche" is pronounced like micro-fish. The prefix micro means one millionth. 2.4 statute miles of intravenous surgical tubing at Yale University Hospital = 1 I.V. LeagueExplanation: Intravenous tubing is also called IV tubing. Yale is one of the Ivy League school, plus 2.4 statute miles is a length equal to 1 league. 1 kilogram of falling figs = 1 fig newtonExplanation: The newton is a unit force, which is mass under acceleration (such as you'd get from falling figs). This play on words refers to the Nabisco cookie, the fig newton. 1000 grams of wet socks = 1 literhosenExplanation: Lederhosen are short breeches (not actually socks). There are 1000 grams of water (more or less) in one liter. The liter is a unit of volume used for liquids, so wet socks are literhosen. 1 trillion pins = 1 terrapinExplanation: The prefix terra means a trillion. 10 rations = 1 decarationExplanation: The prefix deca means 10. 100 rations = 1 C-rationExplanation: C is the Roman numeral for 100. 2 monograms = 1 diagramExplanation: Mono is the prefix for one, while dia means two. 2 new dimes = new paradigmsExplanation: Two dimes is a pair of dimes.
